This year, the crop judging contest will have two sessions. It will consist of the following groups: Grain seed and weed seed judging, Weed Plants, Forage Seeds and Forage Plants. Seed quality judging will consist of four crop classes, with each containing four samples to be placed according to see quality. The four classes will be chosen from the following possible categories: Hard Red Spring Wheat, Hard Red Wheat, Durum Wheat, Barley, Flax, Rye, Alfalfa, Sweet Clover, Grain Sorghum (Milo) and Soybeans. There will be a 25-question agronomy knowledge exam as well.

- 1. All entries must be prepared for the show by the individual entering samples. However, samples need be grown by the contestant.
- 2. All entries must have been grown in the previous year.
- 3. Each individual is allowed only one entry in each class. For example, a contestant may enter a sample of yellow oats and a sample of white oats, but not two samples of yellow oats.

- 4. Make sure all samples are the correct quantity. See the class requirements. Soybeans, seed corn, wheat, oats, barley and rye samples must have the variety name or number identified. Samples of insufficient quantities of unlabeled samples will be disqualified.
- 5. Inoculated seed may be shown, treated seed (i.e. fungicide, insecticide) cannot be entered.
- 6. All hay samples must be machine baled. For hay samples from big round bales, a 30-gallon trash bag full of hay will be enough. Small bales (12"x12"x36" or similar sized) must be submitted in whole.
- 7. Silage samples should be representative (2-3 quarts) and fresh from the silo. Place sample in a plastic zip lock bag or similar transparent container. Keep samples cold or frozen until entry date.
- 8. Samples will be placed by judges from SDSU's Plant Science Department.
- 9. Roundup Ready soybeans will be allowed and judged with the other soybeans.
- 10. Safflower will be allowed under the Oil Crops category.

A new category will be created: "Large-seeded Legumes." One quart of each sample is required. This includes: field beans, field peas, chickpeas, and others.

There are three parts to the contest: General knowledge test, plant identification, along with flower judging and a practicum. The contestants will have 25 minutes to complete a 50-question knowledge exam. The general knowledge exam is a test regarding plant growing structures, insects, retail florist industry, greenhouse equipment, plant nutrients, growing media, plant science, propagation, and the greenhouse industry. Anything in these categories is fair game, so contestants should be well rounded in their knowledge of the floriculture industry. All answers to questions and information can be found in The AIFD Guide to Floral Design Terms, Techniques, and Traditions book published by The American Institute of Floral Designers. Additional questions can be found from previous state Minnesota and South Dakota FFA CDE Exams. The contestants will have 25 minutes to do 40 specimens from an identification list. Each contestant will have 30 seconds to identify the specimen during the contest. The plants will be cut flowers, potted green plants, potted blooming plants, and annual plants. The list that is used for this contest can be found on the South Dakota State FFA website. Hover over the "Events and Programs" tab and click on "Spring CDEs." Rules can be found under Floriculture rules. Contestants will have 25 minutes to complete judging classes and a 10-question practicum. For the first part, four classes will be judged consisting of four samples in each group. They are to be ranked from one (the best of the class) through four (the worst of the class) based on quality and condition. Contestants will receive score cards for each class on the day of the contest. Three minutes will be allowed for each class with a 30 second warning before the end of the three minutes. The specimens for each class will be chosen from this list:

Potted plants: African violets, azalea, chrysanthemum, cineraria, cyclamen, Easter lily, exacum, various foliage plants, geranium, gloxinia, hydrangea, kalanchoe, daffodils, poinsettia, primula, begonia, tulips.

Cut Flowers: Alstroemeria, carnation (standard or miniature), chrysanthemum (including standards, disbuds, or sprays), freesia, gerbera daisy, gladiolus, iris, daffodil, roses (standard or miniature), snapdragon, stock, tulips. Other potted plants or cut flowers with approval of the Committee. For the second part, each participant will solve five problems related to the various aspects of the floriculture industry identified in the CDE objectives. Each problem will describe a situation associated with the floriculture industry and list four possible solutions. Each participant must utilize problem solving skills to select the BEST possible solution to the question. All materials and information necessary to solve the questions will be available to the participant. Time allotment for this test is outlined above. Contestants must bring their own pencils and a hard surface to write on. Little I staff will provide scorecards and answer sheets.

The Vet Science CDE consists of two parts: ID and a written exam. The ID portion includes breeds, parasites, and equipment. The ID list will follow the South Dakota State FFA rules for Vet Science. Participants will be given a copy of the ID list during the time of the contest. Topics for the exam may include the following: Behavior, Disease (causes and sources, signs and clinical signs), Medical terminology, Medical records, Anatomy/physiology, Regulations (OSHA: Federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration; GHS: Globally Harmonized, System for Hazard Communication; SDS: Safety Data Sheets), Patient management, Facility management, Practice management, Genetics, Nutrition, Husbandry.

The Range Plant Identification CDE will consist of a minimum of fifty (50) plant mounts. B. There may be more than one mount of an individual species in the CDE. C. All plants used in this CDE are from the Master Plant List. D. Participants will have one minute per plant for a total of (50) minutes. E. (3) minutes at the end of the CDE will be allowed to go back and look at a plant or plants a second time. G. Participants can move through the CDE faster that this if they prefer. H. Participants will not be allowed to handle the plant mounts; however, a hand magnifier with or without a battery-operated light may be used to assist in identification. I. Participants may use a clean clipboard. VI. Scoring will be as follows: 1. For each plant, the contestants need to know: i. Common Name = 4 points ii. Life Span = 1 point iii. Season of Growth = 1 point iv. Grouse cover = 1-point v. beef food =1 point Therefore, the maximum total per plant is 10 points. If the common name is incorrect, no points can be earned on the characteristics. A score of zero would result for the plant.

General Rules

- 1. For experienced contestants only.... only an exhibitor may work with his or her animal. You may receive verbal help, but no one else can touch the animal.
- 2. All exhibitors must clean up after themselves.
- 3. Any exhibitors who has won a species contest or general contest is not eligible to compete in that species contest or general contest again.
- 4. Anyone is eligible to compete in all contests with the exceptions to all specific divisions in which the top award has been previously won by that individual and anyone who has won the Grand Champion Showmanship Round Robin Award may only compete in non-animal contests in which they have not won grans champion.
- 5. All exhibitors are required to show up for dry run.
- 6. Novice will be allotted ½ points towards high point upperclassman and underclassman awards.
- 7. The champion and reserve champion in all novice events will exhibit in the experienced division to be eligible for round robin.
- 8. Novice points will still be awarded if the exhibitor receives additional points in the experienced competition.
- 9. Antibiotics and other drugs may only be administered by the superintendent or unit manager with the consent of the Little International manager and/or unit manager
- 10. A contestant who has exhibited a species before must compete in the experienced division.
- 11. Novice exhibitors will follow the species rules in which they are competing.
- 12. Drawing for individual species will be done during species drawings.
- 13. All drawings will be done by the species superintendent and livestock coordinator.
- 14. Dairy and Beef competitors **must** have their animal in the practice trailer ride on Monday, March 25th, at 7:00pm, and Thursday, March 28th at 6:00pm.
- 15. If an exhibitor has won either fitting or showmanship in a particular species, they may still compete in the other contest for that specie, but they need to notify the superintendent that they will only be competing in one of the contests
- 16. All exhibitors must wear black pants, white shirts, and a black tie. Cowboy hats are acceptable.

General Rules

- 1. All participants in Little "I" will be required to pay a \$25 deposit (the night of the drawing, Feb.) to insure you will show your animal on March 29th and 30th. If you show your calf, your \$25 will be returned to you on March 31st after stalls have been cleaned after the show. (see rule #7) If you drop before Feb 26, you must contact the superintendent and your \$25 will be returned to you. If you drop after this date, your \$25 will be forfeited.
- 2. Cattle will be able to be worked on Feb. 25th.
- 3. Anyone is eligible to compete in all livestock contests with exceptions to all specific divisions in which the top award has been previously won by that individual and anyone who has won the Grand Champion Showmanship Round Robin Award.
- 4. If a contestant is assisted in the fitting of their animal, the contestant and the helper will both be expelled from all parts of the beef show.
- a. Novice competitors can receive physical help for the first week only, ending on Sunday, March 3rd.
- b. Novice competitors have the option of clipping their heifer themselves or having the Beef Superintendent and Assistant do it for them.
- 5. No drugs or medications will be administered to any animal. The use of any tranquilizer is forbidden. This will result in disqualification.
- 6. Beef Unit personnel will be the only ones feeding the cattle. Cattle cannot be worked on during the feeding hours. 8:00-9:30 a.m.
- 7. Contestants are responsible for cleaning the stalls on a daily basis and bedding them when needed. All contestants are responsible for cleaning their stalls and removing all grooming products after the show or their \$25 will be forfeited. If chutes are not picked up within 1 week, the \$25 is not given back, unless other arrangements are made and approved.
- 8. Due to previous of misplaced light bulbs and other university property, there will be an automatic forfeit of \$25 from all contestants if any problems arise.
- 9. All bulls must be shown with a nose lead.
- 10. Colored powders, paints, creams or dye may be used on the flank and below of the bull of heifer. The use of artificial hair or other materials for building legs or tailheads is strictly prohibited. Violators of any of these rules will be disqualified.
- 11. The Beef Unit is offering Little "I" a service. You must clean up after yourself.

Clean your own stall, keep alleys swept and dry, keep wash rack dry, turn off lights when you are the last to leave, and shut doors and gates.

- 12. All drops should be reported to the superintendent and absolutely no adds, or reassignments of animals will be done without permission or superintendents.
- 13. Under NO circumstances are cattle to be tied to any motorized vehicle or other animals. The use of electrical prods is prohibited.
- 14. Other rules and announcements will be posted on the wash rack door.
- 15. Please return ALL equipment, special feed pans, pails, brooms, blowers and clippers to their designated areas.
- 16. All entrants must wear black pants, a white shirt, and a black tie. Cowboy hats are allowed.
- 17. Novice competitors will only be allowed to draw and show heifers.
- 18. All cattle must be properly washed after the show. Failure to do so will result in forfeit of \$25 for all contestants.

- 1. Cattle will be available to be worked with on March 11th.
- 2. Heifer numbers will be assigned by random drawing by superintendent.
- 3. A list of all heifer numbers and contestants' names will be posted on the west wing sliding door along with the pen in which they can be found. It is very important that you put your heifer back into the pen which she came from when you are done working.
- 4. Make sure your heifer is dry before putting her back outside.
- 5. Dropping and switching of animals must first be approved with superintendents by March 16th .
- 6. All participants in Little "I" will be required to pay a \$25 deposit (the night of the drawing, Feb. 6th) to insure you will show your animal on March 29 and 30. If you show your calf, your \$25 will be returned to you on March 31, after all stalls have been cleaned after the show. (See rule #10) If you drop before March 11th, you must contact the superintendent and your \$25 will be returned to you. If you drop after this date, your \$25 will be forfeited.
- 7. All equipment needed to wash, clip, and show animals must be supplied by the contestants.
- 8. Clean up area after working with your animal.
- 9. Contestants cannot work on their animals during the Dairy Unit's milking times: 5:30-8:00 am and 5:30-8:00 pm.
- 10. Contestants are responsible for cleaning stalls on a daily basis and bedding them when needed. All contestants are responsible for cleaning their stalls and removing all grooming equipment after the show or their \$25 will be forfeited.
- 11. All contestants must wear black pants, a white shirt, and black tie. Cowboy hats are allowed.
- 12. Under NO circumstances may cattle be tied to any motorized vehicle or other animals. The use of electric prods is prohibited.
- 13. No drugs or medications will be administrated to any animal. The use of any tranquilizer is forbidden. This will result in disqualification.
- 14. All cattle must be properly washed after the show.
- 15. Anyone else eligible to compete in all livestock contests with exceptions to all divisions in which the top award has been previously won by that individual and anyone who has won the Grand Champion Showmanship Round Robin Award.
- 16. Head locks must be turned off when done.
- 17. All \$25 deposits will be forfeited if dairy unit garage is vandalized, including painting on walls.

What is it?

The High Point Club Award is in its seventh year. It is a competition for organizations in the College of Agriculture, Food, and Environmental Sciences of South Dakota State University. Clubs will arrange teams to compete in contests in Little "I" and gain points toward the High Point Club title.

Rules:

1. Students can **NOT** judge on a team for their club if they are a superintendent or assistant of one of the contests.

Little I

- 2. Students can **NOT** judge in a contest if they were/are a member of that collegiate judging team.
- 3. Contest rules are the same for the collegiate members as the high school contests.
- 4. Individuals must choose one club to represent.
- 5. A tie will be broken on the percentage of members participating in the showmanship/fitting contests.
- 6. Clubs do not need to participate in every contest, however it is recommended for maximum points.

Round Robin Showmanship Contest

The Round Robin Showmanship Contest will be a showmanship contest for the champion and reserve champion winners of each specie experienced showmanship contest to compete for the overall showmanship award. This contest will take place at 8:10 pm on March 30.

General Rules

- 1. There will be a total of twelve contestants, with two contestants from each species.
- 2. The champion and reserve champion experienced showman from each species will compete.
- 3. Each contestant will bring their animal to be used in the contest.
- 4. A rotation will be 5 minutes long. Each contestant will exhibit all six species.
- 5. In the case of an individual winning grand champion showman in more than one species, a coin flip will be conducted to determine which species he/she will represent. The species not represented by the individual will bring the third-place showman to compete in the round robin competition.
- 6. An individual who has won the round robin showmanship contest in the past may not exhibit livestock at Little International in the future years. However, the individual may compete in general contests.
- 7. The Round Robin contest will count towards points in the high point freshman and upperclassman competitions. However, placing in the round robin contest may be used as a tie breaker.
